Launch of ADB Report on Climate-Induced Migration

United Nations Conference Centre, Meeting Room B 13 March 2012

Climate change will be a major driver of migration in Asia and the Pacific this century. A staggering 42 million people in the region were displaced by environmental disasters over the past two years, with the region having six of the 10 most climate-change vulnerable countries in the world.

The new ADB report, Addressing Climate Change and Migration in Asia and the Pacific, argues that disaster-prone Asia and Pacific countries must act now to stave off future humanitarian crises. The report includes detailed analyses of climate change impacts on migration in Asian sub-regions, highlighting 'hot spots'. It also shows how governments and the private sector can work together to finance the cost of climate-induced migration.

Most importantly, this is the first study to develop policy recommendations to address the phenomenon at the regional level.
