

“I'm proud to have brought the rain back”: reforestation revives Cambodian mountains

Communities in Cambodia are now harvesting the fruits of their reforestation initiative in Mt. Kulen. Once a hotspot for illegal logging, Mt. Kulen's forest is now on its way to recovery.

Through the support of The Adaptation Fund, UNEP helped the government of Cambodia and its partners in establishing a nursery. The initiative provided materials to grow trees on Kulen and supported local livelihoods. People in Chuop Tasok's community-protected area also received 100,000 seedlings. Saplings were also donated to patrol groups that supported the planting of more than a quarter of a million trees and protected 306 hectares of forest from illegal logging. The increased forest canopy improved the ecosystem of the area. However, the greatest joy and relief the communities have is the return of the rains in their area, which enabled them to farm again.
